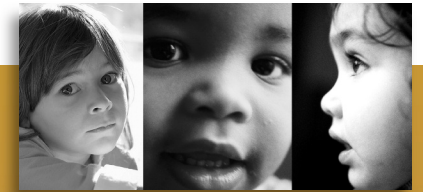

A four-person family earning less than \$22,050 a year sets the poverty standard. Based on that “definition,” at least 14 million children, newborn to age 18, live in poverty in the United States and Puerto Rico.

Double a family’s annual income to \$44,100—which still qualifies as low income, or 200% of poverty level—and the number of children living in low-income situations grows to more than 28 million.

Members of low-income families often struggle with a variety of negative consequences, depending on the presence or absence of extended family and community support:

- Inadequate health and dental care
- Limited access to transportation
- Low-quality education
- Low self-esteem
- Hunger
- Homelessness
- Frequent moves
- Isolation
- Illiteracy
- Domestic violence



Youth Lead a Response

The youth of First Baptist Church (FBC) in New London, N.H., are calling the youth of American Baptist Churches USA to raise both money and awareness for children in poverty nationwide.

In 2008, when FBC youth learned that 60,000 children were living in poverty in their state, they



wanted to visualize that number. They decided to collect a penny to represent each child, so FBC youth canvassed the community, asking for pennies from church members, schools, and nearby neighborhoods. Within six months, they amassed 60,000 pennies!

Before donating the money to local food pantries, homeless shelters, and other organizations, they raised awareness by taking the pennies to the state house, where they met with the governor and state representatives.

Now FBC youth implore you to join their efforts to raise at least 14 million pennies to represent the number of children living in poverty in the United States and Puerto Rico.



Poverty is pervasive in rural, urban, and suburban communities. If poverty is invisible in your community, look on the other side of town. No one is geographically far removed from poverty.

Hope for The Penny Project

This project is about more than doing something for someone. This project is about walking with people in poverty.



It’s more than a handout. It’s holding hands with our neighbors and friends.

The Penny Project provides:

- **Education** about the issue.
- **Reflection** about personal faith and how it calls individuals to care for each other.
- **Inspiration** that little gifts as small as pennies, when brought together, can lead to great change.
- **Connection** with a local ministry effectively addressing issues of hunger, homelessness, illiteracy, and isolation among children.
- **Association** with legislators in your city, county, state, and nation to advocate for more compassionate policies for families in need.

As you collect pennies and other coins, FBC youth ask you to:

- Share with your congregation what you have learned about the children in your community, state, or region who experience hunger, homelessness, isolation, or illiteracy, and lift those concerns in prayer.
- Contact legislators in your community, county, or state to find out how they plan to address the issue of children living in poverty.
- Choose to support a program or ministry that is responding to hunger, homelessness, isolation, or illiteracy issues affecting children in your town or one nearby.
